## CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

## Chairman's Report

I am pleased to provide my first Report as Chair of NZ Water Polo (NZWP). As an opening comment it would be fair to say that while I am very aware of the challenges that we face in our sport I am very excited about the opportunities ahead of us.

The potential is clear. We have:

- very strong and increasing participation numbers such as an increase from 640 to 790 Flippa Ball teams and a 10% growth in club players
- a developing pathway for our elite players and
- the potential to compete at the Olympics.

We feel hosting the World League in April potentially moves us forward in all these aspects as we look to show case our great sport and further develop our players.

Given the lessons learned from our 2016 hosting of the Women's World Youth Championships we believe that we remain on track for the 2018 World League event to be at least break even. The biennial Pan Pacs in the middle of this year is also on track to be a success for both the players and financially. I would like to thank in advance all the volunteers for these events.

While our small profit for the 2017 year is an improvement on the losses from the previous two years our financial position is still not as strong as it needs to be to enable water polo to fulfil its real potential in New Zealand.

Which brings me on to one of our key challenges – that of funding. We are not alone amongst sports in New Zealand to face funding constraints. However, I feel with the right drive and focus NZWP can improve its current "hand to mouth" funding position. A real improvement in our funding position can be achieved through implementing clear initiatives in each of the key funding areas:

- 1. Grants
- 2. Corporate Sponsorships
- 3. Individual donations
- 4. Events and activities

This is a major focus of the Board and new CEO in 2018 and beyond as we see real opportunities in each of the four funding segments above.

Another major focus will be the implementation of NZWP's key strategies. The Board recently spent some time on reaffirming its key priorities of:

- 1. Participation
- 2. Sustainability
- 3. Performance

With our new CEO, Chris Wilson, starting in early March it will be a good time to review the implementation plans for each these key areas and how best to structure our organisation to make it as efficient and effective as possible. I would like to formally welcome Chris and look forward to his contribution in taking our sport forward.

I would like to acknowledge the contribution of all the staff in the NZWP office who strive to do the best for our sport, often with very little resources. 2018 will be a year of change in terms of the NZWP office personnel with the retirement of John Payne as CEO and with our High-Performance Director Eelco Uri leaving NZWP for a new role. I would like to take this opportunity to publicly thank both of them for their contribution to NZWP, which is deeply appreciated. I would like to wish John all the best for his well-earned retirement and the same to Eelco for his new role.

There is one change at the Board level and that is Alex McKenzie is coming off the board to undertake his big "OE". Alex has made a real contribution in providing a very useful perspective of a current player. I am pleased that we have had some very high-quality candidates apply, which as per the Constitution were assessed by a Selection Panel of myself, Howard Lewis and Chris Hayward. From this one of two candidates is to be the Elected (by the clubs) Director while the Appointed Director is selected by the Panel.

While I am in thank-you mode mention must be made of the huge contributions to our sport made by the volunteers with the clubs as well as to the referees and coaches. Without you all we would not have a sport and your input is both invaluable and appreciated and of course some will be recognised at the 2018 Awards night. As an aside increased development for coaches and referees remains a key strategic imperative for our sport.

I would also like to take the opportunity to thank all the members of the NZWP board, Chris Hayward (who attends most meetings) and our patron Sir Stephen Tindall. I feel that we have a good mix of skills on the board, that there is open debate and discourse but at the heart of our board is a unity to look to do what is best for our sport.

I look forward to the rest of the 2018 year given all the exciting events and activities ahead of us. I also look forward to NZWP working well together with all water polo participants for the good of our sport. We have huge potential for water polo in this country if we work positively and constructively together and I, and the rest of the NZWP Board and Executive will be striving to do this in 2018.

## **Water Polo for Everyone**

## 1 - Player Numbers

## Key measurement

Our key measurement for participation is the number of people playing our sport.

This year Flippa Ball teams rose from 640 to 790 teams through growth in the Leagues, in particular Epsom which finished the year with a record 104 teams.

School team numbers, both intermediate and secondary schools, have slightly increased.

Club players increased by 200 players, up 10.4% on last year.

## **Club Players**

Overall club playing numbers increased to a total of 2,164. This is an increase of 331 players over the past 2 years. We had a new club in Atlantis who had 60% of their players new to Water Polo.

Growth in teams playing at Nationals were: Under 14's (8 more teams), Under 16's (7 more teams), and Under 21's (8 teams). National League (1 more team). Under 21's were successfully introduced this year with 8 men's teams. The senior Tier 2 competition was run again with eight men's teams but as with Under 21's there were insufficient women's teams to be able to have a competition.

## Sport distribution across NZ

The areas that had player increases were Auckland, Wellington and Otago with drop offs in Waikato, Tauranga and Southland. Canterbury was stable and Marlborough competed at National level for the first time.

## The Future

Flippa Ball continues to feed the growth in under 12 numbers and we are expecting under 14's and Under 16's to continue to grow. The continuation of the National Tier 2 tournaments and under 21's will continue to retain more senior players. The combination of introduction and retention is expected to boost our numbers. The availability of pool space will still be a constraining factor, although Christchurch have pools in the process of being planned and built.

## 2 - Coaches & Officials

## **Development**

Once again, a big thank you to our referees, coaches and other officials; our sport would not be the success it is without the huge effort you all put in it.

Six referee clinics, covering most of the country, were delivered during the year by John Waldow with 102 attendees. These were followed up with evaluations at the South Island tri-series and National championships.

At Under 14 Nationals we trialed cost equalization of referees and a new method of allocating them to championships. This resulted in an improved standard of refereeing and allowed development of several younger referees. The success of this means that this will be standard at our future national events.

Greater numbers and better quality referees continues to be a priority of NZWP with a potential enhanced coach development programme being considered.

## 3 - Facilities

## **Availability**

More pools is a long term project and involves NZ Water Polo and the local clubs working together to ensure any new pools are suitable for Water Polo. In Auckland there is planning for a new pool in West Auckland – completion date 10 years away. The Metro pool complex in Christchurch is going through yet another revision and is still some time away.

## 4 - Competitions and Events

## **Competitions**

In 2017 we held the Premier National League, Tier 2, Under 21, Under 18, Under 16 and Under 14 National Championships along with the Secondary School championships and the Under 12 tournaments. 44 competitions in total. Congratulations to all our clubs for their achievements and efforts. An overview of national championships rankings can be found further on in this report.

Fabian Wanrooij has settled very well into his role in organising these competitions and, with the assistance of our volunteers and referees, they have run very successful tournaments with overall positive feedback in the club survey. Our thanks to them all.

## 5 - The Office

John Payne is retiring after World League and his replacement Chris Wilson will start on the 5<sup>th</sup> of March so there will be a suitable transition and handover period.

Eelco Uri, after 10 years with NZ Water Polo, has accepted an offer with Australia Water Polo as their Competitions Manager, he also leaves after World League in April.

Wilson Longhurst accepted a position with TVNZ and left us at the end of January. His replacement is Larissa Batajelo who has extensive experience in journalism and media of all types.

## **PERFORMANCE**

## National Teams Programme (NTP)

## **Annual Report 2017**

2017 was another busy year for the National Teams Programme; the RTC programmes continued on from 2016 with the highlight being the RTC Challenges in October where over 125 players came together playing games, being tested, doing skill work, and had class room education sessions.

We saw the men's head coach Goran Sablic leave for a contract in the USA and are thankful for the hard work he did, especially around the Junior World Championships campaign and the 2017 Men's World League campaign.

We are very pleased to have secured Davor Carevic as Goran's successor, and he will continue as the Men's Pathway Head Coach.

Zoltan Boros has been appointed as the senior men's assistant coach and Quentin Quin as the team Manager.

A big thank you to all our coaches, management personnel and of course parents and caregivers; without your dedication and support our programmes simply would not exist.

Highlights for 2017 were the senior men in the FINA Water Polo World League Inter-Continental Tournament defeating China and placing 5<sup>th</sup> and for our senior women in the 2017 World Championships in Budapest showing good progress towards their Tokyo goal. Another highlight was the first time a NZ Women's water polo team competed in the World University Games (Taipei).

Both NZ Junior Teams showed their potential at their respective World Junior Championships and the NZ School Teams both successfully defended their Trans-Tasman Shields in Australia; a fantastic achievement.

2018 is well underway and there are several target events to look forward to:

- FINA Water Polo World League Inter-Continental Cup
- 3-8 April, Auckland New Zealand
- FINA World Men's Youth Water Polo Championships
- 11-19 August, Szombathely Hungary
- FINA World Women's Youth Water Polo Championships
- 27 August 2 September, Belgrade Serbia

We will continue to refine, expand and streamline the NTP and are looking forward doing this in cooperation with our clubs, centres and stakeholders.

## **Secure our Future**

### 2017 Result

Our operating activities recorded a small surplus off \$953, in line with the expected breakeven result and a significant improvement from last year's loss.


As can be seen from the chart below grants are our biggest source of income but were down \$109,000 on last year as in 2016 we received grants for: Pan Pacs \$48,000 and World Youth Champs \$81,000. In 2017 we received \$45,000 less from Sport NZ for salaries but had grants for pool hireage of \$55,000 and sponsorship of \$10,000. Pool hire was hit by increased costs for lifeguards.

Flippaball and Competitions are our next largest income source. The running costs of NZWP paid from our income were \$23,000 down in Human resources and up \$4,000 in Administration costs.

The National Teams programme recorded a surplus of \$1,766.

The Foundation earned \$959.

## Distribution to national teams

There has been no additional funds distribution to the National Teams Programme. (The balance still to be utilised is \$5,980). These funds were used to pay the pathway and senior coaches.

## Comments on the financial report

Obtaining funding is getting more and more difficult for National Sports Organisations (NSO's). From January the annual funding from Sport NZ reduced by \$50,000 to \$20,000 a year.

Funding is a prime focus and we are continuing to work on obtaining as much funding as we can and are exploring all opportunities.

# Sponsorship We have spent considerable time and effort on securing on going sponsors. Honda came on board in December and are providing 3 vehicles for use by staff over the next three years. They have also agreed to provide vehicles for International events, such as World League and Pan Pacs. This is total sponsorship is worth \$40,000 a year to our sport and we are extremely appreciative of them. The foundation is a charitable trust. The Board and The Trustees are looking at an appropriate strategy for the Foundation going forward. The balance in the Foundation account is \$31,846.

We will be looking to increase the retention of senior women's players with Tier 2.

Assessing a potential enhanced coaching programme

Increasing the number of Flippa Ball teams.

Running successful World League and Pan Pacs competitions.

## NTP

We are working towards Olympic qualification.

Hosting the FINA Water Polo World League Inter-Continental Cup, in which our Senior Men's and Women's team are competing and sending them to the Commonwealth championships.

The Youth Men's and Women's teams are attending World Championships in Europe.

## **Notes to the Consolidated Financial Statements**

For the 12 month period ended 31 December 2017

## 1. Statement of Accounting Policies

## A) i) Entity Reporting

New Zealand Water Polo Association Inc. is an Incorporated Society registered under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908 and a registered Charity under the Charities Act 2005. The Society established the New Zealand Water Polo Foundation under the Charitable Trusts Act 1957 on the 25 September 2014. The objective of the foundation is to support sporting or charitable purposes and in particular, through education, coaching grants and the development of facilities, to encourage the participation of youth in NZ in the sport of water polo.

For the purposes of financial reporting, the society is a public benefit entity (not-for-profit).

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with New Zealand Generally Accepted Accounting Practice ("NZ GAAP"). For the purposes of financial reporting they comply with PBE Accounting Standards Not-For-Profit and Tier 2 reduced disclosure concessions have been applied.

The society has elected to report in accordance with PBE Accounting Standards Not-For-Profit Tier 2 on the basis that it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses of less than \$30 million.

The statement of cash flows has been prepared using the direct method. The financial statements are prepared on an accrual basis.

The consolidated financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis.

## ii) Presentation Currency

The consolidated financial statements are presented in New Zealand dollars has been rounded to the nearest dollar, except when otherwise indicated.

## iii) Basis of consolidation

Business combinations are accounted for using the acquisition method as at the acquisition date, which is the date on which control is transferred to the Group. Control is the power to govern the financial and operating policies of an entity so as to obtain benefits from its activities. In assessing control the Group takes into account potential voting rights that currently are exercisable.

## **Subsidiaries**

Subsidiaries are those entities controlled, directly or indirectly, by the Society. The financial statements of subsidiaries are included in the financial statements using the purchase method of consolidation.

### vi) Transactions eliminated on consolidation

All intergroup transactions and balances are eliminated on consolidation

## **B)** Measurement Base

The measurement system adopted is that of historical cost.

## C) Specific Accounting Policies

The following specific accounting policies, which materially affect the measurement of consolidated financial results and consolidated financial position, have been adopted in the preparation of the consolidated financial statements.



## For the 12 month period ended 31 December 2017

### **Accounts Receivable**

Accounts receivable are recognised and carried at original invoice amount less any allowance for any uncollectable amounts. Individually impaired accounts receivable relates to debtors for whom there is objective evidence of inability to pay. Accounts receivable are financial assets that are classified as loan and receivables.

### **Valuation of Inventories**

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value after making due allowance for damaged and obsolete stock.

### Goods & Services Tax

All amounts are shown exclusive of GST, with the exception of accounts receivable and accounts payable which are shown inclusive of GST.

### Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with financial institutions, other short-term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value, and bank overdrafts.

## D) Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in Accounting Policies. All policies have been applied on bases consistent with those used in previous years.

### E) Comparatives

The current period financial statements of NZWP are for the twelve months ended 31 December 2017. The comparative figures are for the 12 months ended 31 December 2016.

### 2. Taxation

The society is exempt from income tax under Income Tax Act 2007 on income earned for charitable purposes in New Zealand.

## A) Use of estimates and judgements

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with PBE Accounting Standards Tier 2 requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognized in the period in which the estimates are revised and in any future periods affected.
