## CHAIRMANS REPORT

---

This being my last report as chair of New Zealand Water Polo it gives me great pleasure to report meeting all our targets and exceeding our budgeted expectations in the financial year recently completed.

There were many critical of decisions made four years ago by the board, but as we have consolidated our strategy and stayed focused on our core services we have gone from strength to strength.

This is in large part due to the vast number of volunteers who willingly donate their time and energy to our sport. We could not achieve the things we do without you.

This is regularly witnessed throughout the country and touches everyone involved in the game. Thank you all for your efforts and continued support.

Huge recognition needs to go to the 4 people who deliver to our sport and are our only paid administrators. Pam, Russell, Eelco and James. As a board we have identified that we cannot continue to provide the depth and breadth of service we currently do with only 4 people in head office.

The organization of tournaments, coaching programs, FlippaBall and our administration generally has stepped up a notch in the last 2 years. Our finances are in a much better state, but having said that we are still dependent on Charitable Trusts for our ultimate survival.

We are making strides towards self-sustainability and that is evidenced through us being involved in running approximately 52 tournaments a year in some way. That averages out at one a week and we must therefore remember the enormous work rate from our colleagues and volunteers. Trying to quantify the sport's contribution to the wider community and economic impact is difficult to assess but we have started to build a model, which helps with this assessment. We hope this will give us the information we need to be able to get more financial support for our great game.

Application for Charitable status of the Foundation has been made to the Charities Commission and the inaugural Trustees appointed by the NZWP Board will be, David Jackson, Prem Maan, Keith Brodie, John Payne and myself. I am also very pleased to report that Sir Owen Glenn has agreed to be the first Patron of the Foundation.

Sir Stephen Tindall has agreed to continue as Patron of NZ Water Polo and we are grateful to him for his continued support and wisdom.

Although under positive stress most aspects of our sport are being well managed at the moment. Since the appointment of James Davidson in the Auckland region, FlippaBall has shown a strong growth trend. To date we are seeing growth of approximately 30% per annum in the Auckland area and when combined with the development of Junior Water Polo the region is showing real signs of positive development. The flow on effect of this growth must inevitably be pressure on clubs to pick up these children and the pool space to accommodate the growth. It's good to see the building of a new pool at the Millennium Centre started, as I'm sure that will help take some of the stress off existing facilities once opened.

New clubs, so vital to the development of the sport in New Zealand, has also picked up. In this last 12 months we have seen the establishment of the Hibiscus Coast and Sea Wolf Water Polo Clubs. Since the end of the financial year Kapiti Water Polo Club has also become established. As a strategy NZWP wanted to encourage the start of at least one club per annum. This is another positive development for the sport, as it will ultimately add to the depth of participants in the game. We now have 18 registered clubs affiliated to NZWP and we should be aiming to have at least 30 within the next 10 years.

It appears to be true that wherever a new facility is built a new club becomes established so it is important for NZWP and all aquatic sporting bodies to become active in their local communities and promote new deep-water facilities as much as they possibly can.

## **Chairman's Report,** continued

Our high performance teams continue to compete at the highest levels Internationally but under financial stress to the individuals who participate. It seems counter-intuitive that High Performance Sport New Zealand will only back proven performers and the small pot of money available to up and coming sports or individuals is hard to get.

Our Junior Male and Female teams performed incredibly well this year and we should be making every endeavor to try and build on this success by keeping them together and building their competitive skills internationally. Unfortunately unless we find a source of funds outside of High Performance NZ the burden of costs will continue to fall on the parents and fund-raising activities undertaken by willing volunteers and supporters. The high performance aspect of water polo in NZ will be one area where the Foundation will look to help out in the future.

Our top referees continue to be recognized by FINA and we are pleased to have the maximum allowable contingent of 7 international referees on their list. New Zealand Water Polo continues to be a strong supporter of the FINA family globally and we will be applying to host another International competition shortly. Whether our submission and application is awarded we will have to wait and see. But we are hopeful of building on our successful hosting of other international events. Eelco and Russell have a strong commitment to excellence when running these tournaments and we seem to be able to refine them every time we run them.

As always we would be nothing without the support of our Charitable Trusts. Their contribution to our strategic direction through the funding of our daily operations and tournaments is commendable and appreciated. It is through their direct support that we are able to reach out to 15,000+ individuals in the wider water polo community and deliver a wonderful experience in our sport. We would like to thank you all and hope we can continue to deliver to your expectations so our partnerships remain intact.

To the current board members and all the others I have had the privilege of serving with over the last 9 years, I thank you for your contribution, support and the voluntary hours you have all committed over that time.

Under the new structure of 4 elected and 4 appointed members the risks will be to drift into management and be less focused on delivering to strategy. Bringing a range of skills and perspective to the board table will be very important for the board to remain effective over the coming years.

The separation of management from governance that took place in 2004 has been very positive for the sport as a whole. We have had a few hiccups, but that is what growth and managing risk is all about. Fortunately we have a strong collective memory and will remember the historical events that have lead us to this very positive time in our sports journey in New Zealand.

The future is bright and the next 10 years holds the key to our participation on the global stage. The remaining members of current board and the two newly appointed members have a strong commitment to change and making our sport better at all levels of the game.

Finally, this is the end of an era. Under the new board rules and constitution Chris Hayward (CH as we fondly know him as) cannot stand again for reappointment to the board. His selfless contribution to NZ Water Polo over the years has been tremendous and must be acknowledged in this my final note. He has so many local and international friends and acquaintances within the sport I'm sure he'll continue to focus on supporting the achievements of up and coming players, referees, administrators, and he will always be available for advice for years to come.

As a life member CH also retains the right to attend board meetings as an observer or as a sub-committee member so his expertise will not be lost.

I have appreciated your advice and knowledgeable contributions around the board table over the years. From me CH it is a humble thank you, from our sport it is the acclamation so richly deserved for a person who has given so much such as you.

NZ Water Polo is committed to expanding the online resources for officials to meet the need of knowledge expansion and to ensure continuous improvement.





**COACH DEVELOPMENT**



# BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT REPORT

---

## PROUD TO BE PART OF WATER POLO

We spend a lot of time addressing funding opportunities so we needed a brief summary of "Why Water Polo?". The following is what we came up with:

---

### 90 EVENTS

The NZWP community delivers around 90 events every year. Including 50 from NZWP with the aid of volunteers and delivery partners:

- 16 National Championships
- 28 Flippa Ball Leagues and activities
- 5 Regional U12 / Intermediate Tournaments
- 1 large international event

---

### 14,000

There are over 14,000 participants playing Water Polo in New Zealand. They play for :

- Clubs
- Schools - Primary, Intermediate and Secondary.
- Social Leagues

---

### 5,000

Over 5,000 primary school children across New Zealand have participated at least once in Flippa Ball Leagues over the last year. This number grew by 21% last year. Over 3,500 also took part in Flippa Ball activities (not competition).

---

### AQUATIC CONFIDENCE/ COMPETENCY

Water Polo provides a fun environment where skills and fitness are encouraged. Values such as teamwork, learning to win and lose and commitment are part of the learning environment.

However, from the surveys we have held:

- Over 50% of our Flippa Ball participants have never had a swimming lesson.
- Over 50% of our players never came through a swimming club.

Our sport provides the motivation for children to become very aquatically competent.

---

### \$3 MILLION

Over the past three years the international competitions run by NZWP have brought over \$3 Million of economic benefit to New Zealand through international bed-nights. Each Pan Pacs brings over 800 international visitors who stay for approximately 4,300 bed nights. Each event generates almost \$900,000 in international bed night only.

---

### 600%

Less than \$500,000 was invested by government (through Sport NZ and MED) and Councils in NZWP and the events over the past three years.

We returned over \$3 Million – this is a return on investment of over 600%.

Unfortunately Sport NZ only value sport by the numbers taking part in the activity.

---

### \$4 MILLION

Over the next three years the forecasted international competitions that NZWP will host will bring over \$4 Million of economic benefit to New Zealand.

---

This is impressive!

The economic impact that Water Polo in New Zealand has on the community is disproportionate considering the size of the sport and the number of paid employees. We are compared to Hockey the ability to host large events however they have 21 staff where we have 4!

When people ask about Water Polo you can tell them a great story backed with facts.

We may all agree that we have a long way to go however we do need to reflect on what we have and be proud.

# FINANCIAL REPORT

---

Once again the financial report is better than was expected compared to the budgets approved by the board at the beginning of the year.

Our surplus result is a combination of the two accounts that we have, one for the NZWP activities and the second for the High Performance activities. The figure of \$86,517 reflects a surplus of \$117,537 for the former and a deficit of \$31,020 for the latter.

The High Performance account is used to fund coaches, training camps and tours and is kept separate from the other activities of NZWP. The funds in this account comprise of:

- surplus's from fund raising activities,
- funds paid by athletes participating in the programmes towards their costs.

Year on year, if the High Performance surplus/deficit is removed, the surplus from the activities of NZWP are approximately \$75,151 for 2012 and \$117,537 for 2013. The difference in the two years roughly equates to the surplus from hosting two international competitions.

Areas to note on reviewing the Statement of Financial Performance are:

1. **Competitions Revenue Centre**  
During the 2012/13 year NZWP delivered two international events – The 2012 Pan Pacific Youth Water Polo Festival and the 2013 FINA Water Polo World League, Asia Oceania. Although the surplus for these events plus the National Championships looks impressive the grants that have supported these events (see the Notes to the Financial Statements 4B) equal the surplus. This means the significant effort that the office and key volunteers put into national and international events would amount to a break even situation without gaming trust grants.
2. **Flippa Ball Revenue Centre**  
Flippa Ball continues to be a major contributor to NZWP without which we would not be able to operate with the same level of staffing. Although the 2013 figure is down on the previous year this reflects less funding being granted for the activity. If the funding is taken out of both years (funding amounts are listed in the Notes to the Financial Statements 4B).then the surplus from Flippa Ball has grown by \$21,000 or 23% year on year.
3. **Development Service Centre**  
The past year there was very little scheduled for Development which is reflected in the amount spent in this area. Looking forward, the Strategic Plan identifies a lot of work in this area.
4. **High Performance Teams Service Centre**  
The deficit in the High Performance accounts reflects the level of investment that has gone back into the programs over the last year. A considerable amount of effort goes into fundraising by the High Performance Conveners and teams which means that the programs have collectively benefited by more than \$100,000 of funding. This is manifested in coach payments and the amount that individuals in the teams travelling have had to pay being reduced.
5. **Administration**  
The year on year change in the Administration surplus is due to the reduction in accrued annual leave by the staff of NZWP. In other words the paid employees took enough holidays to be able to reduce the accrued amount by approximately \$13,000.

Funding continues to be a challenge with most Gaming Trusts signaling, once again, a drop in funding revenue which leads to a drop in the available funds for redistribution. The 2012/13 year has been particularly difficult with one of our beneficial trusts losing sites in Auckland resulting in almost zero funding from that source. In addition some other funders not being able to assist or reducing their grants meant that particularly in the Flippa Ball area we were well under our expected grant income.

In Summary - despite a reduction in funding we were still able to produce a healthy surplus.



# Notes to the Financial Statements

For the Period Ended 30 June 2013

## 1. Statement of Accounting Policies

### A) i) Entity Reporting

New Zealand Water Polo Association Inc. is an Incorporated Society registered under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908 and a registered Charity under the Charities Act 2005. These financial statements have been prepared according to the New Zealand generally accepted accounting practice.

### ii) Adoption of International Financial Reporting Standards

In September 2007 the Accounting Standard Review Board (ASRB) decided that the mandatory adoption of NZ IFRS should be delayed for certain small entities. This decision was formally announced in ASRB Release 9 and will not be adopting NZ IFRS until the reporting requirements have been clarified.

The financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis.

### iii) Differential Reporting

New Zealand Water Polo Association Inc qualifies for differential reporting by virtue of the fact that it has no public accountability and the entity is not large in terms of the size criteria specified by the Framework for Differential Reporting.

The association has taken advantage of all differential reporting exemptions.

## B) Measurement Base

The measurement system adopted is that of historical cost.

## C) Specific Accounting Policies

The following specific accounting policies, which materially affect the measurement of financial results and financial position, have been adopted in the preparation of the financial statements.

### Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable are stated at estimated realisable value after providing against debts where collection is doubtful.

### Valuation of Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value after making due allowance for damaged and obsolete stock.

### Goods & Services Tax

These financial statements have been prepared on a GST exclusive basis where all items in the Revenue Accounts have been recorded exclusive of GST as have Stock on Hand and Fixed Assets (used principally for business purposes) in the Statement of Financial Position inclusive of GST.

### Fixed Assets

Fixed assets are included at cost less accumulated Depreciation. Depreciation is calculated using the following rates:

Furniture	18% -50%	D.V.
Software & equipment	40%	D.V.
Water polo equipment	25 -67%	D.V.

### Revenue Recognition

Grants and player fees are included in the Statement of Financial Performance as soon as they are receivable and the economic benefit benefits are expected to flow to the Incorporated Society. Grants and player fees received for a specific purpose are treated as income received in advance until used for that purpose.



**The Funnel**



## OBITUARIES

---

It is with sadness that New Zealand Water Polo notes the passing of, Life Member Jaap de Haan, Service Award Holder Trish Cox and Graeme Small.

### **Jaap de Haan**

Jaap was a big man with a big heart and a big personality. He came to NZ in 1956 but didn't referee straight away.

Jaap as a goalie was an impressive sight. He dominated the area around the goalmouth and only the quickest and most accurate shots passed his usually safe hands. His crouch in the water, head forward and back up, often made it appear that he would be slow to rise but this in fact was his greatest strength. A sudden straightening of the body and he had the whole goal covered. Murray McGirr tells of approaching Jaap with the ball in hand ready to score: *'I was suddenly so terrified by this bulk ahead of me that I dropped the ball and froze, totally bewildered'*.

Not only did Jaap quickly become a feature in NZ water polo. In Christchurch he was universally recognised as the owner/manager of the Centaurus Ice Rink. Almost all kids went ice skating at some stage and the Big Man controlling the entrance and the ice was someone not to be crossed. Jaap was also passionate about volleyball and was well known as a top referee in that sport.

In 1963 Jaap became NZ's first internationally graded water polo referee and it was so significant at the time that he was interviewed on a Christchurch television sports programme. His poolside style was very direct, easily understood by players and spectators and, perhaps above all else, flamboyant and entertaining. During a period when huge crowds came to water polo matches, often to see fights and expulsions, Jaap had few issues with being the sole controller.

Jaap also served in a myriad of other positions to the benefit of water polo. He was Secretary of the Canterbury and NZ Water Polo Boards and the NZ Referees' Association, a selector for Canterbury and NZ, a coach, a team manager, a tour and tournament organiser, a mentor and a friend to many water polo enthusiasts. He thoroughly deserved his Life Membership of NZWP. Jaap will be missed.

### **Trish Cox**

After a two year battle with cancer Trish Cox passed away on Sunday 12 August 2012 with her family by her side.

Trish has been very involved with the Women's High Performance Programme for the past 10 years acting as Team Manager on a number of occasions and more recently has been in charge of the supply of uniforms to all our female players.

Trish was a member of Marist Auckland Club Committee during the 1990's and early 2000's.

Trish was also awarded a Service Award from NZ Water Polo in 2011.

Trish set an example that will continue to be an inspiration to us all.

NZ Water Polo would like to extend its deepest sympathy to Trish's daughters Stephanie, Emily, Kathryn and extended family. Our hearts go out to them in their time of sorrow.

Trish will be greatly missed.

### **Graeme Small**

Graeme passed away on 25 May 2013 after a battle with cancer.

He was a great supporter of Water Polo, and the Waitakere club in particular. Graeme and Penny's two boys Richard & Matt played for Auckland Grammar School and Waitakere and Richard also played for Marist. Both have represented New Zealand in the men's team.

He managed teams at Junior College and Waitakere, offered support and was generally there to help whenever it was needed. His happy demeanour around the poolside will be sorely missed.
