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Chairperson & Chief Executive Report

2024 has been a year filled with growth, success, and opportunity for water polo in New Zealand.

It's also been a year of hard work, challenges, powerful performances, and community activity. Therefore its firstly thanks every one of you – athletes, coaches, parents, officials, sponsors, volunteers, administrators, and supporters – for being part of this incredible journey. Together, we're building something truly special.



Our athletes have made waves on the world stage this year. A few key highlights:

- Historic finish at the World Aquatics Championships Our Women's National Team achieved an outstanding 9th place finish in Doha, Qatar (Olympic year) one of our best results from the modern era. They narrowly missed Paris Olympic qualification losing by 2 goals to Canada. Special mention to Angie our senior women's head coach who has worked tirelessly over many years to deliver such a performance.
- We have NZ women competing in the top leagues and teams in Europe and our men and women in the USA College system NCAA, all doing us proud.
- U18 Women's World Championship Success Our Under-18 Women's team secured 8th place at the World Aquatics U18 Championships in Chengdu, China, backing up the U18 women's 8th place in 2022, and the U20 women's 8th place in 2023, thus proving that our women belong in the world's top 8.
- **U18 Men's World Championships** this year, the men finished a credible 12th place, significantly improving on past performances.
- International Coaching Excellence We're proud of former New Zealand Water
 Polo Coach of the Year, Justin Pickering, who led Salem University to the NCAA
 National Collegiate Championships in the USA a sign of New Zealand's coaching
 expertise being recognised globally.
- 60 NZ athletes competed in the Australia U15/17 State Championships coming home with multiple medals.





None of this would be possible without support from our partners, sponsors, Sport NZ, NZOC, Trust Grants, and High Performance Sport New Zealand and of course our volunteers.

This year, we again secured **essential** high performance funding from HPSNZ to support our elite female athletes. It's this backing that helps us deliver better results on the global stage and develop future stars. NZ Water polo was the only team sport in 2024 that received an increase in HP funding up 76% to \$150k pa.

We've also made strides in athlete wellbeing. With HPSNZ support, we've created a new **Athlete Wellbeing**Framework, ensuring our players have access to the mental, physical, and emotional support they need to thrive – both in sport and in life.

Athlete Development funding has enabled us to deliver increased training opportunities, and create continual year on year age group pathways that builds the pipeline feeding Senior National Teams.

And finally, we want to acknowledge the **individual athlete scholarships**. These grants have made it possible for our players to balance university studies with their high performance goals – a critical step for the future of our sport.

At home, our national championships, competitions, and festivals are ever growing with all available pool space being maximised.

- The Suzuki National League
 continues as a platform for New
 Zealand's top domestic talent to
 shine. From young players looking
 to break through to seasoned
 veterans this league is our
 proving ground.
- Our National Competitions and Festivals at all age levels and abilities provided valuable competitive experiences for players across New Zealand where can athletes enjoy and have fun through water polo.
- We strive to grow at grassroots level through the ever-popular
 Flippa Ball programme, bringing younger generations into the sport and building a love for water polo that will last a lifetime.



Through competitions, pathways, and grassroots initiatives, we're ensuring that water polo remains strong for future generations.

None of this happens without you. To our staff, coaches, athletes, officials, sponsors, administrators, volunteers, and our wider water polo whānau – **thank you**. Your hard work, dedication, and belief in our sport drive us forward every day.

We would like to extend a special thank you to the NZWP Board who have dug deep this year, and challenged and supported the organisation – we are really grateful to you all. To the management team in Jan, Pam, Blake, Eelco, Polly, Henry, Jhanna, Helena and Tanisha your resilience and hard work has not been unnoticed thank you so much for everything you do.

Looking ahead to 2025, we have big goals. We're building on this year's momentum, pushing for even stronger performances, more pathways for young talent, and greater community engagement.

We invite you all to stay connected, stay involved, and stay inspired.

Together, we will continue to grow water polo in Aotearoa.

BOARD GOVERNANCE STATEMENT

Disclosure of Governance Practices

The directors are responsible for the governance of the New Zealand Water Polo Association. This statement sets out the main practices that were in operation throughout the financial year.

Board of Directors

The board has a board charter which sets out its role and responsibilities. A summary of the make-up of the board and how it discharges its duties and responsibilities follows:

- · the number of directors on the board should be no fewer than eight.
- the composition of the board is determined according to the needs of the
 Association and directors are recruited based on their individual specialist skills as
 well as the breadth of their backgrounds and skills and experience. Diversity is a
 key factor in board composition.
- the board meets a minimum of five times per calendar year, including a meeting dedicated to the review and development of strategy.
 - the board has established the Finance and Risk Committee and the People, Culture and Community Committee. The Finance and Risk Committee is a standing Committee. The People, Culture and Community Committee was established as an ad-hoc Committee to oversee the delivery of the areas of the strategy relevant to its mandate.
- all relevant information relating to items to be discussed at a meeting of the board is required to be provided by the CEO to each director prior to that meeting.
- the board, its individual directors and the chair are subject to regular evaluation.

The board consists of four appointed and four elected directors. The CEO attends all board and board Committee meetings except where specifically exempted during "board only" board meeting sessions. Details of the directors are set out on page 8.

 has implemented adequate systems of internal control together with appropriate
 monitoring of compliance activities.





From grassroots programs in local Flippa Ball leagues to our clubs and competing on the national level, we are proud to see water polo in New Zealand continue to develop.

The tireless work of our coaches, volunteers, and clubs has been instrumental in making water polo accessible and enjoyable for everyone, regardless of age or skill level.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

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To the Members of the New Zealand Water Polo Association Incorporated

Opinion

We have audited the consolidated financial statements of New Zealand Water Polo Association Incorporated (the "entity") and its controlled entity (the "group"), which comprise the consolidated financial statements on pages 39 to 48 and the service performance information on pages 35 to 38. The complete set of financial statements comprise the consolidated statement of financial position as at 31 December 2024, and the consolidated statement of comprehensive revenue and expense, consolidated statement of movements in equity, and consolidated statement of cash flows and other operating activities for the year then ended, and notes to the consolidated financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

In our opinion, the accompanying consolidated financial statements presents fairly, in all material respects:

Other than in our capacity as auditor we have no relationship with, or interests in, the entity or its controlled entity.

The Directors are responsible for the other information. The other information obtained at the date of this auditor's report is information contained in the annual report but does not include the consolidated financial statements and our auditor's report thereon.

Our opinion on the consolidated financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not express any form of audit opinion or assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the consolidated financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the consolidated financial statements, or our knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

Responsibilities of the Directors for the Consolidated Financial Statements

The Directors are responsible on behalf of the group for:

- The preparation, and fair presentation of the consolidated financial statements in accordance with the applicable financial reporting framework;
- The selection of elements/aspects of service performance, performance measures and/or descriptions and measurement bases or evaluation methods that present service performance information that is appropriate and meaningful in accordance with the applicable financial reporting framework;
- The preparation and fair presentation of service performance information in accordance with the group's measurement bases or evaluation methods, in accordance with the applicable financial reporting framework;





Notes to the Consolidated Financial Statements

For the 12 month period ended 31 December 2024

1. Statement of Accounting Policies

A) i) Entity Reporting

New Zealand Water Polo Association Inc. is an Incorporated Society registered under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908 and a registered Charity under the Charities Act 2005. These consolidated financial statements comprise the society and its controlled entity, the New Zealand Water Polo Foundation (together - the Group). The Society established the New Zealand Water Polo Foundation under the Charitable Trusts Act 1957 on the 25 September 2014. The objective of the foundation is to support sporting or charitable purposes and in particular, through education, coaching grants and the development of facilities, to encourage the participation of youth in NZ in the sport of water polo.

For the purposes of financial reporting, the Group is a public benefit entity (not-for-profit).

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with New Zealand Generally Accepted Accounting Practice ("NZ GAAP").

For the purposes of financial reporting, they comply with PBE Accounting Standards Not-For-Profit and Tier 2 reduced disclosure concessions have been applied.

The Group has elected to report in accordance with PBE Accounting Standards Not-For-Profit Tier 2 and is eligible to report under those standards on the basis that it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses of less than \$33 million.

The statement of cash flows has been prepared using the direct method. The financial statements are prepared on an accrual basis. The consolidated financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis.

ii) Presentation Currency

The consolidated financial statements are presented in New Zealand dollars and have been rounded to the nearest dollar, except when otherwise indicated.

iii) Basis of consolidation

Business combinations are accounted for using the acquisition method as at the acquisition date, which is the date on which control is transferred to the Group. Control is the power to govern the financial and operating policies of an entity so as to obtain benefits from its activities. In assessing control, the Group takes into account potential voting rights that currently are exercisable.

Controlled Entities

Controlled entities are those entities controlled, directly or indirectly, by the Society. The financial statements of controlled entities are included in the financial statements using the purchase method of consolidation.

iv) Changes to Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies during the financial year (last year - nil).

B) Measurement Base

The measurement system adopted is that of historical cost.

C) Specific Accounting Policies

The following specific accounting policies, which materially affect the measurement of consolidated financial results and consolidated financial position, have been adopted in the preparation of the consolidated financial statements.

Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable are recognised and carried at original invoice amount less any allowance for any uncollectable amounts. Individually impaired accounts receivable relates to debtors for whom there is objective evidence of inability to pay. Accounts receivable are financial assets measured at amortised cost.

Valuation of Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value after making due allowance for damaged and obsolete stock.

Goods & Services Tax

All amounts are shown exclusive of GST, with the exception of accounts receivable and accounts payable which are shown inclusive of GST.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with financial institutions, other short-term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value, and bank overdrafts. Term deposits with an original maturity of more than three months do not form part of the cash and cash equivalents and are recorded separately in the statement of financial position.

Employee benefits

Short term employee benefit liabilities are recognised where the group has a legal or constructive obligation to remunerate employees for services provided and that are expected to be settled wholly before 12 months after the reporting date. Short-term employee benefits are measured on an undiscounted basis and expensed in the period in which the services are provided.

Defined contribution plans are post-employment benefit plans under which an entity pays fixed contributions into a separate entity and will have no legal or constructive obligation to pay further amounts. Obligations for contributions to defined contribution pension plans are recognised as an employee benefit expense in surplus or deficit in the periods during which services are rendered by employees.

Financial instruments - accounting policy

i. Recognition and initial measurement

Receivables are initially recognised when they are originated. All other financial assets and financial liabilities are initially recognised when the Group becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

A financial asset or financial liability is initially measured at fair value plus transaction costs that are directly attributable to its acquisition or issue. At initial recognition, an entity may measure short-term receivables and payables at the original invoice amount if the effect of discounting is immaterial.

ii. Classification and subsequent measurement

Financial assets

On initial recognition, a financial asset is classified as measured at: amortised cost; fair value through other comprehensive revenue and expense (FVOCRE) – debt investment and equity investment; or fair value through surplus or deficit (FVTSD).

Financial assets are not reclassified subsequent to their initial recognition unless the Group changes its management model for managing financial assets, in which case all affected financial assets are reclassified on the first day of the first reporting period following the change in the management model.

A financial asset is measured at amortised cost if it meets both of the following conditions and is not designated as at FVTSD:

- it is held within a management model whose objective is to hold assets to collect contractual cash flows; and
- its contractual terms give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

All of the Group's financial assets are financial assets at amortised cost, and consist of cash and cash equivalents, term deposits, and debtors. These assets are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. The amortised cost is reduced by impairment losses. Interest income, foreign exchange gains and losses and impairment are recognised in surplus or deficit. Any gain or loss on derecognition is recognised in surplus or deficit.

Financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are classified as measured at amortised cost or FVTSD. A financial liability is classified as at FVTSD if it is classified as held-for-trading, it is a derivative or it is designated as such on initial recognition.

Financial liabilities at FVTSD are measured at fair value and net gains and losses, including any interest expense, are recognised in surplus or deficit. Other financial liabilities are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Interest expense and foreign exchange gains and losses are recognised in surplus or deficit. Any gain or loss on derecognition is also recognised in surplus of deficit.

All of the Company's financial liabilities are measured at amortised cost and consist of creditors.

iii. Derecognition

Financial assets

The Group derecognises a financial asset when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial asset expire, or it transfers the rights to receive the contractual cash flows in a transaction in which substantially all of the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset are transferred or in which the Group neither transfers nor retains substantially all of the risks and rewards of ownership and it does not retain control of the financial asset.



Notes to the Consolidated Financial Statements Cont.

Financial liabilities

The Group derecognises a financial liability when its contractual obligations are discharged or cancelled or expire. The Group also derecognises a financial liability when its terms are modified and the cash flows of the modified liability are substantially different, in which case a new financial liability based on the modified terms is recognised at fair value.

On derecognition of a financial liability, the difference between the carrying amount extinguished and the consideration paid (including any non-cash assets transferred or liabilities assumed) is recognised in surplus or deficit.

iv. Offsetting

Financial assets and financial liabilities are offset, and the net amount presented in the statement of financial position when, and only when, the Group currently has a legally enforceable right to set off the amounts and it intends either to settle them on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

v. Impairment of non-derivative financial assets

The Group recognises loss allowances for expected credit losses (ECLs) on financial assets measured at amortised cost.

Loss allowances for trade receivables are always measured at an amount equal to lifetime ECLs. When determining whether the credit risk of a financial asset has increased significantly since initial recognition and when estimating ECLs, the Group considers reasonable and supportable information that is relevant and available without undue cost or effort. This includes both quantitative and qualitative information and analysis, based on the Group's historical experience and informed credit assessment and including forward-looking information. The Group assumes that the credit risk on a financial asset has increased significantly if it is more than 30 days past due.

The Group considers a financial asset to be in default when:

- the borrower is unlikely to pay its credit obligations to the Group in full, without recourse by the Group to actions such as realising security (if any is held); or
- the financial asset is more than 90 days past due.

D) Comparatives

The current period consolidated financial statements of the Group are for the twelve months ended 31 December 2024. The comparative figures are for the 12 months ended 31 December 2023. Certain prior year balances have been reclassified to ensure consistency with current year's presentation.

E) Use of estimates and judgements

The preparation of the consolidated financial statements in conformity with PBE Accounting Standards Tier 2 requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimates are revised and in any future periods affected. There are no significant judgements or estimates made in the preparation of these financial statements.

Judgements in relation to the consolidated statement of service performance

In compiling the Group's Statement of Service Performance report, Management has made judgements in relation to which outcomes and outputs best reflect the achievement of our performance in accordance with the Group's purpose.

The Group's purpose, values, and key focus areas are based on its founding documents and strategic plan. The measures chosen for each focus area are considered to be the most important driver of success for that area, and have been approved by the Board.

There is very little judgement or estimation required for each measure that has been disclosed. Club participation numbers are based on data provided by each club.

2. Taxation

The Group is exempt from income tax under Income Tax Act 2007 on income earned for charitable purposes in New Zealand.

4. Revenue

Revenue - Accounting policy

Revenue is recognised when the amount of revenue can be measured reliably and it is probable that economic benefits will flow to the Group and measured at the fair value of consideration received or receivable.

The following specific recognition criteria in relation to the Group's revenue streams must also be met before revenue is recognised.

Revenue from exchange transactions

Player Revenue

Player revenue is recognised when the services have been provided. Amounts received in advance are recognised as a liability until such time as the services have been provided.

Competition fees

Revenue from competition fees is recognised once the related competition has been held.

Revenue from non-exchange transactions

Non-exchange transactions are those where the Group receives an inflow of resources (i.e., cash and other tangible or intangible items) but provides no (or nominal) direct consideration in return.

With the exception of services-in-kind, inflows of resources from non-exchange transactions are only recognised as assets where both:

- -It is probable that the associated future economic benefit or service potential will flow to the entity, and
- -Fair value is reliably measurable.

Inflows of resources from non-exchange transactions that are recognised as assets are recognised as non-exchange revenue, to the extent that a liability is not recognised in respect to the same inflow.

Liabilities are recognised in relation to inflows of resources from non-exchange transactions when there is a resulting present obligation as a result of the non-exchange transactions, where both:

- -It is probable that an outflow of resources embodying future economic benefit or service potential will be required to settle the obligation, and
- -The amount of the obligation can be reliably estimated.

The following specific recognition criteria in relation to the Group's non-exchange transaction revenue streams must also be met before revenue is recognised

Sponsorship

Revenue from sponsorship agreements is recognised as the related services are provided in accordance with the terms of the sponsorship agreements

Grants and Donations

The recognition of non-exchange revenue from Grants and Donations depends on the nature of any stipulations attached to the inflow of resources received and whether this creates a liability (i.e. present obligation) rather than the recognition of revenue.

Stipulations that are "conditions" specifically require the Group to return the inflow of resources received if they are not utilised in the way stipulated, resulting in the recognition of a non-exchange liability that is subsequently recognised as non-exchange revenue as and when the 'conditions' are satisfied.

Stipulations that are 'restrictions' do not specifically require the Group to return the inflow of resources received if they are not utilised in the way stipulated, and therefore do not result in the recognition of a non-exchange liability, which results in the immediate recognition of non-exchange revenue.



In remembrance of those we have lost, we dedicate this section to the cherished members of our community who have passed away over the past year. Their contributions have left an indelible mark on our organisation. As we honour their memories, we reflect on their legacies and the impact they have had on all of us. Their spirit and dedication will continue to inspire us as we move forward.



Mark Harding

It is with sadness that we advise of Mark's death – after a short battle with cancer.

Mark's sporting achievements deserve, and will get, fuller coverage from those closer to him than me. However, it can be recognised here that Mark was an exceptional sportsman. He was extraordinarily strong as a teenager, swift in the water, talented as an all-round water polo player and highly regarded in other sports.

In a period when many water polo players excelled athletically – especially in swimming, surf lifesaving and basketball – the 1970s included some who reached elite levels in rugby. For example, the 1975 NZ Men's team included Russell McConnochie (Otago Colts & U21 teams), Paul Tuoro (Counties and NZ Maoris), Murray Davie (Canterbury and

1983 All Blacks) and Mark (Canterbury, NZ U21s & U23s and 1983 Wallabies).

From his early days in Christchurch club water polo, with age group Canterbury and NZ teams, Mark became an automatic selection for the senior Canterbury and NZ Men's teams. He represented NZ from 1973 to 1982 and again, from Sydney (where he had become a staunch member of the Cronulla water polo fraternity), in 1988. A fellow player in that 1988 team, Brendan Horan, describes Mark as being 'a great team-mate and a wonderful person'.

In an on-line reunion of the 1975 team (in 2020), Mark described himself as 'still having everything he was born with: no new knees, hips or shoulders'. He will be sorely missed.

Murray Scott

The Canterbury water polo team won 28 of the 58 National Provincial Championships held in the period 1909 to 1976. This domination of the sport in New Zealand included the last two critical decades when one man played a part perhaps unequalled in terms of playing, coaching and administration. He was Murray Scott. Murray died on 23 September after a long illness.

Introduced to water polo at his beloved Beckenham Club in the mid 1950s, when there was no junior, schools or women's water polo, Murray had to learn quickly how to hold his place, often literally, amongst men who were experienced in the fine arts of underwater grappling. Over the years he became an expert. Never the fastest swimmer, Murray compensated with his determination, defensive abilities, strength and ball skills. He was in the Canterbury team for several years and then became its

dedicated coach. He was also coach of Beckenham-Sockburn when it won the Ryan Cup (for national inter-club competition) for three consecutive years – 1974-76.

In 1972 Murray was selected in the NZ Tournament team and awarded the honour of captaincy. [Members of the national side, for which Murray was considered an unlucky omission, were not considered for selection.]

Well known Christchurch sports journalist and author, Ray Cairns, wrote vividly about Murray. A couple of Ray Cairns' most notable quotes were:

- His style of play has always been rather robust and he revels in upsetting both the composure and reputations of opposing forwards.
- That, in 1972 when retirement from representative play beckoned for Murray, 'The Canterbury team will not seem the same without Scott. He was first chosen for the senior side when

he was 18, and in the 14 seasons since that time, has only twice missed the national championships – and then because he was unavailable'.

Murray became a NZ selector and coach of the NZ team to Australia in 1973, NZ manager of the men's team to Europe in 1974, coach of the 1975 NZ men's team at the NZ Games in Christchurch - when the team played Australia, Yugoslavia, Russia, USA and Great Britain (against whom it recorded its first ever international win 6-3) – and coach of the NZ team in 1976.

Murray had close family connections in water polo. Brothers Lindsay and Bevan both played in Canterbury teams and wife, Charmaine, was an ever patient supporter. Murray served on the NZWP Board and Canterbury WP Board (as Chairman) for several years.

Wayne Martlew

Wayne rose to prominence in NZ water polo as a youngster and quickly developed through the senior ranks in the 1960s and 1970s. He had a stroke a few years ago and didn't recover as hoped. His favoured left arm, so strong when attacking opponents' goals, was rendered weak and his speech was a little impaired. Facing other difficulties, Wayne had a fall recently, possibly as a result of a further stroke. He died earlier this week at his home in Australia.

Wayne was a long-standing and enthusiastic member of the Hutt Swimming Club. He was an outstanding swimmer but it was water polo in which he represented NZ. In 1965 Wayne was selected in the NZ Men's team which travelled to Hobart to play in the Australian Championships. It was deliberately selected as a 'young team for the future' and contained only two experienced senior players: Andrew Kocsis, a former member of the pre-

revolution 1956 Hungarian Olympic squad, and Charlie Bird, the Auckland goalkeeper. The team played training matches in Hobart against state teams until the Australian water polo authorities arrived and stated that they had not officially invited the NZ team – so the team had to return home.

With brother, Gary, who also swam, played and coached at a high level in NZ, the pair, alongside several other dynamic and successful Hutt personalities, were formidable.

Wayne went on to be selected in the NZ U-23 team which toured Victoria in 1969 and NZ teams which played in Australia, Europe and NZ in the 1972-75 period. He did not fit the mould of a big, tall player but he was fast and extremely effective on the right hand post. Wayne scored a lot of goals. He will be remembered.
